Charles Drew Blood Drive in Partnership with American Red Cross and Sickle Cell Anemia

Saturday July 21st 9am-4pm

One of every twelve African Americans has the sickle cell trait and one in every 375 African-American newborns has sickle cell disease.

Over half of those with sickle cell disease require a blood transfusion during their lifetime. The majority require multiple transfusions. Some patients with very severe sickle cell disease receive blood transfusions every month. It could take 30,000 donations to find a match for one patient to have a monthly transfusion. To prevent blood from being rejected, patients need to receive blood that is closely matched. Donors are more likely to be a good match for a patient if they are the same ethnic background. You can assist the Red Cross in providing a good match by circling your race on the blood donor record you complete when donating.

The goal of the region's American Red Cross is to increase the percentage of African American donors to 8 percent and to have 100 percent of those donors noting their race on the blood donor form. By indicating race, donors are helping the Red Cross to focus their search to donors with a higher probability of matching the sickle cell patient's blood.

NTA urges you to come out and support the July 21th Blood Drive.

Studies have shown a decline in academic performance during the transition from elementary school to middle school. Students who previously made the honor roll, suddenly begin to bring home Cs. We with the N.A.S.A. Project do not believe that this reflects a lack of ability on the part of our students. Students at this time are changing both emotionally and physically due to the onset of adolescence. The teaching style used for middle school is different from that of elementary school. Parents also have to employ a different set of skills to provide the support and guidance needed during this transition. The N.A.S.A. Projects want to reach this population and seeks promising students with a GPA between 2.0 and 3.0.


Mark Your Calendars for June Meeting!!
